



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Three main ways to grow Strawberries

Matted Row Berries Annual Bed System Everbearing

Earlier yield

- We usually start picking 7-10 days earlier than matted row in our area
- premium price + ours are the 1st they taste every year.



Cleaner fruit

Mix of straw/mulch keeps plants and fruit much cleaner

You can actually go along with a blower and blow off the plastic to reduce water damage after a storm

Keeps grey mold and other diseases to an absolute minimum







Profitability- 21' figures Gross \$5,000 on 3,000 sq ft

Builds soil

 We apply 4-5 tons to the acre of straw or weed free hay/mulch

keeps mud and weeds down, the fruit clean, and increases organic matter.

here we're using 3 cut rained on alfalfa, which will also add nitrogen.

using the point to anchor the tip into the soil



Grown in 50 cell flats

Misted for 30 seconds every 5 minutes









Ready to plant out!

We want to get the plants in the ground the 1st or 2nd week of September.









Spreading straw/hay

Key is to have weed-free straw or hay

Covered with rowcover before crown temperature reaches 20 degrees



What the field looks like in February!



Rowcovers are kept on in the spring until about 10% blossom.

Covers are coming on and off to prevent the blossoms from freezing.





Keeping the birds out



keep them irrigated

2 + inches a week

only water in morning- goal is to keep the leaves and fruit dry- drip is great
